From the minister...

This week will be the final week of our study on the Old Testament book of Ruth, and with this week's newsletter you will find the final set of study notes. I hope you have been enjoying this study as much as I have, and hopefully it has led you deeper into God's Word. The book of Ruth is much more than a simple standalone story set in isolation – it dovetails into so many other parts of scripture, that both come before it in Genesis, and also later as we discover (spoiler alert!) that Ruth is actually the great-grandmother of none other than the great King David. King David is himself an ancestor of Jesus, of course.

The book of Ruth, when you consider it as a whole, is an account of a desperate and apparently hopeless situation being transformed by God's sovereign power and purpose into a sequence of events which He has pre-ordained for the future salvation of the whole world. He brings order out of chaos, hope out of disaster, strength out of weakness.

This speaks directly into our current lockdown situation. Whatever the challenge of these times in which we are living, we know from studying Ruth that the Lord keeps his promises and is faithful. If we remain faithful to the Lord throughout this period of uncertainty, as Ruth did, then He will give us the same blessing and peace as He gave to her (and to Naomi). Come to the Lord for your protection: as it says in Proverbs 18:10:

"The name of the Lord is a fortified tower; the righteous run to it and are safe."

Please note everyone that I will be on leave for the next two weeks, so please don't try to contact me by phone or email. The other ministers in the circuit are available should you need them. I will still be doing the usual live-streamed service each Sunday morning throughout this period, but not the weekday broadcasts.
