Remembering the Tolpuddle Martyrs



The Tolpuddle Martyrs were farm workers who became early trade union activists. Most were Methodists, three being lay preachers. In the 1830s life in villages like Tolpuddle was hard and getting worse. Farm workers could not bear yet more cuts to their pay. Some fought back by smashing the new threshing machines but this brought harsh punishments. In 1834, farm workers in west Dorset formed a trade union. Unions were lawful and growing fast but six leaders were arrested and sentenced to seven years' transportation for taking an oath of secrecy. A massive protest swept across the country. Thousands of people marched through London and many more organised petitions and meetings to demand their freedom. The annual Tolpuddle Festival takes place this weekend - online this year. Barry's Isolation Diary week 15 – Scouting problems

What to write about this week? Normally by Wednesday I have always had something, not necessarily of interest, to tell you about. This, the sixteenth week of semi-isolation, nothing notable has come to mind. Perhaps this is just a reflection of the fact that after all this time life has truly settled into a new normal. The highlight of this week has been a visit to the National Trust gardens at Standen. Booking opens each Friday at 9am. I waited for 30 minutes in the queue online to try and book Nymans, eventually giving up and changing my request to Standen whereupon I had a wide choice of times and days. The house is closed but the cafe is open for take away drinks and cakes as is the shop, and it was not crowded due to the limits on numbers.

As Chair of Crawley District Scouts we have been wrestling with the problems associated with a return to face to face Scouting, albeit currently only outdoors and restricted to a maximum of 15 young people. Every venue and planned activity has to have a separate pre-approved risk assessment. Across Crawley there are twelve venues, not counting public open spaces and, if every section meets once a week, there will be a minimum of thirty seven meetings per week. So you can, I hope, see the size of the administrative problem. As an example you would think it would be simple, with a 28 acre woodland campsite split into 10 fields with four separate toilet blocks, to meet all the social distancing rules etc. The problem is that the moment you think you have covered everything, you almost immediately think of another "what if"...

The next phase, as restrictions are lifted, will be for larger outdoor groups and small indoor meetings. We have to hope that this occurs before the nights draw in and also that the weather remains clement. Never will the phrase "if wet" take on a more significant meaning!

Then there is the tricky question of ensuring that none of the leaders are put at risk due either to their underlying medical conditions, or worse, their age. Would you fancy telling a leader of many years that due to their age we can't allow them to take the risk of mixing with the young people at present.....

It just goes to show how life has become far less spontaneous, with almost every activity needing to be planned and booked in advance.

Finding new ministers

Two weeks ago, in ET issue 16, Rev Melvyn Cooke, our Circuit Superintendent, wrote an account of the complicated process of finding and appointing new presbyters (ministers). With both Rev Ralph and Rev Felicity moving on in September 2021, the Circuit Invitation Committee held a Zoom meeting last week to start the process. Our discussions largely focused on the difficulties we face at a time when there are simply not enough new candidates coming out of college to fill all the vacancies in circuits around the country.

Two years ago we had to recognise that we could no longer have the luxury of each of our five churches being in the care of its own minister and we moved to the situation where Redhill and Horley 'share' Rev Felicity, and Trinity and St Paul's 'share' Rev Ralph. We're used to this now and it is working well.

We are also mindful of the new experiences of digital church that have come our way during the lockdown and have proved in many ways beneficial to opening up our mission to a wider community.

We are trying hard to find the best ways forward in challenging and changing times. We would hope to find two new presbyters, or perhaps one full presbyter and a probationer, but nothing is guaranteed. Please pray that whatever ideas and intentions we have, they are part of God's plan for us. *Joyce*
