From the minister...

We all noted an anniversary of particular significance this week as we passed the "one year of Covid" milestone. Wind back the clock to March of last year: little did any of us anticipate that the lockdown would last as long as it has. I remember being shocked back then to hear the Prime Minister predict that the pandemic may cause up to 20,000 deaths – how would we have felt knowing what we know now, with an ongoing total of 126,000 deaths and counting. We really didn't anticipate the scale of the challenge that was coming. I remember thinking, naively and optimistically, that I would probably catch Covid 19 at some point – but I was certain, given that I am reasonably fit and healthy, with no underlying medical conditions, that it would just be like having the 'flu. As it turned out, Covid is far more menacing, and far less respecting of age and general health.

My heart goes out to all who have suffered and succumbed, and if you have lost someone you love to this terrible virus then my prayers are with you, as are all of those in our church. But if you have successfully made it this far, and received the first (maybe both) of your vaccinations, then perhaps you share my feelings currently that we have been delivered by the grace of God, and also by the skills of our scientific community, medical and nursing staff, and all who work as part of the ongoing vaccination programme.

When Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a young donkey on the day we now celebrate as Palm Sunday, he alone knew the full implications of the challenge which lay ahead. The disciples were naïve and clueless (despite Jesus having told them three times what lay in wait for him once they arrived at the capital). The crowd who had followed him down from Galilee, growing in numbers constantly as Jesus passed through their towns and villages along the way, were even more naïve. Optimism was running enormously high – they firmly believed that Jesus, the Messiah, was on route to reclaim the nation for God. They believed him to be in the line of King David, and that the Golden Age of Israel was about to be restored, both spiritually and politically.

Yet Jesus was the only person in that triumphal entry into Jerusalem who knew what truly lay ahead. He was to share pain and suffering, to fully embrace the human condition. That he did so willingly, expresses to us now in 2021 the extent to which he understands the pain and suffering which all of humanity has endured during the Coronavirus pandemic. He has been there – he is not detached or aloof. He is connected with our pain because he has felt it himself.

As Springtime starts to arrive, we are able to look forward with a little more hope to the end of our present tribulation. The cross reminds us that even when all hope appears to be gone, the Lord can still bring about our deliverance. Stand firm in Jesus.

How to get your Palm Cross this year

Palm Sunday commemorates Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey with his followers spreading palm branches, symbols of victory and triumph, at his feet with cries of "Hosanna" as he passed by. Christian churches traditionally hand out palm crosses to their congregation as a reminder of Christ's victory over death.

This year we won't be in church to hand out the crosses but, if you happen to be passing St Paul's this Saturday, Sunday or Monday, there will be palm crosses in the porch so that you can take one for yourself and, if you wish, another to pass on to someone else. St Paul's people who receive this newsletter by post will have one included.

Methodist Church to start major new project on being a justice-seeking Church

The Methodist Church is to commit to a two-year project lookinat how the Church speaks out on social issues and challenges injustices. The project will be led by Rachel Lampard and aims to make the Church more effective in speaking and acting for justice and transformation.

Rachel Lampard, who will shortly move to this secondment from her role as Team Leader of the Joint Public Issues Team said: "I am excited to be part of this project listening to Methodists and those beyond our church, including those who are sometimes unheard; discerning the values upon which our commitment to justice can be based; and acting to help Methodists use these resources to speak and act on issues of justice.

"I hope and pray that this will be a project which engages people from around the Connexion and leaves us all with a deeper passion for God's justice in the world."

The Methodist Church's Head of Mission Jude Levermore said: "The world is living in a time of huge change with domestic and global injustices being revealed and intensified. Methodists have long committed to working for justice. Now is the time for The Methodist Church to renew its voice as a justice-seeking church."
