From the minister...

Can I take this opportunity to wish you all a very happy and blessed Easter. It has been a challenging year, when we have all been held in the grip of restrictions and regulations which have limited our movement and social interaction to a great degree. It has been a year of sorrow and anxiety for many people, with an overwhelming feeling of uncertainty which has not yet receded.

But as I write we are starting to see changes taking place, as we follow the Government's road map for recovery. After a long hard Winter when all of us have suffered to a greater or lesser degree, the Spring sunshine has begun to appear again: the flowers are appearing, the colour is returning. As I write we have enjoyed a couple of lovely warm Spring days – there are birds on the feeders and the magnolia trees are coming out in all their glory.

Easter is a time when we always celebrate the new birth of Springtime: but this year it seems more dramatic and significant than usual, given the coincidence of our gradual deliverance from Covid. When Jesus lay in the tomb from Friday to Sunday, all of his followers must have felt that all hope was gone. But they had forgotten Jesus' words in John 12:24:

"Very truly I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds."

Even through the darkest of experiences, new hope can be reborn. Jesus has proved this. If you have found your hope draining away over the Winter, come to the Lord in prayer and allow him to revive you through his Holy Spirit. As you are permitted, venture outside once more to experience the world being revived by God's creative power. Whatever your experience of the Coronavirus pandemic, this Easter is the time to start looking forward with hope, rather than looking back with sadness.

When Jesus returned to life on Easter Sunday, the effect of his victory was not immediate in the hearts of his disciples. For a while, even though they could see their risen Lord face to face, they struggled to believe that it was true. Despite being able to touch him, eat with him, hear him speak to them once again, it took them some time to regain the confidence to step out in faith as they had before. But as time passed their boldness increased.

Have you noticed that two of the significant dates in the Government's easing of lockdown (April 12th and May 17th) have some degree of proximity to

two of the major dates in our Christian calendar? Easter Sunday is on April 7th, and Pentecost on May 23rd. As we take our first tentative steps to freedom this month, let's anticipate the arrival of Pentecost this year with more optimism and vigour than usual. Because it was at that first Pentecost that the Holy Spirit arrived in power, and a whole new chapter of life began. May that be true for all of us as we faithfully await our deliverance.

As previously announced, I will be taking a three month sabbatical with effect from Thursday April 1st. This means that I am not contactable at all until July 1st. So please don't be tempted to send me emails or post which you think should merit my attention upon my return — this will create a huge backlog which I will find it impossible to address. Instead, should you require ministerial assistance I would urge you to contact Rev Clive McKie during April, and from May 2nd onwards contact Rev Melvyn Cooke. 
Crawley CAP Debt Centre celebrates 6 years in Crawley



In their April newsletter, Crawley CAP (Christians CAP Debt Centre | Against Poverty) report that in their first 6 years in the town, supporting people and families struggling

with debt, more than 50 families have gone debt-free and over 100 individuals have taken the Money Course. They have also established Life Skills training, a Jobs Club and a Drop-In Café which will re-open in the summer.

There's plenty of other encouraging news and some job opportunities, some paid, some voluntary. The work of CAP is becoming even more important in our town as a result of people losing jobs during the pandemic.
